

Dr. David Salsberg is a licensed clinical neuropsychologist in Manhattan and a clinical instructor at The NYU School of Medicine. Dr. Salsberg is the Supervisor of Pediatric Psychology at NYU Langone Medical Center's Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation, Hospital for Joint Diseases, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and The Stephen D. Hassenfeld Children's Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders. He also directs a private practice in Manhattan, Pediatric Assessment, Learning & Support (PALS), which conducts neuropsychological, educational and speech and language evaluations for children; as well as school consultation and advocacy. Dr. Salsberg works with children of all ages and their families with various physical, neurological, psychological and learning disabilities. In teaching and clinical work his primary focus is on the proper assessment, diagnosis and appropriate school and treatment recommendations for each child.

Dr. Salsberg has published numerous articles and chapters, led research, and has presented at grand rounds and conferences at numerous hospitals, schools and institutions. Dr. Salsberg has also served as an expert witness in civil, federal and criminal court cases, in addition to many educational law hearings. He has been interviewed on topics such as child development, neuropsychological evaluations, autism and trauma in various periodicals including New York Magazine; and has been featured on two episodes of Keeping Kids Healthy on PBS channel thirteen.

In addition to clinical work, Dr. Salsberg helped develop and serves on the board of a number of not-for-profit organizations. One organization, Growth and Development Services and Camp Excel, leads year-round and camp programs for underprivileged and at-risk teenagers. The other not-for-profit is The IDEAL School, a private school in Manhattan committed to an inclusion model of education. Dr. Salsberg also serves on numerous professional advisory boards, including The Gateway School in Manhattan.
