This camp is designed for children ages 5-12. There are four sessions lasting two weeks long and a final session that lasts for one week. The sessions are Monday-Friday. There are also 3-day and 2-day summerlong sessions. The 3-day sessions meet on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The 2-day sessions meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays. All sessions are from 8:30am-3:30pm. The camp features a wheelchair accessible pool, arts and crafts, music, sports, drama, nature and outdoor play. The camp counselors receive seizure first aid training and a registered nurse is on duty at all times.

All counselors receive specialized training in seizure recognition and first aid and a licensed nurse is in residence at all times. The camper to counselor ratio is 3 to 1.

The Epilepsy Foundation Western/Central Pennsylvania sponsors a week-long, overnight summer camping program called Camp Frog, located on the shores of Lake Erie. Camp Frog allows kids with epilepsy/seizure disorders to be integrated into a typical camping experience with hundreds of other children. The overnight program is available to boys and girls with epilepsy/seizure disorders from grades 4 to 11. Campers enjoy a host of activities, such as archery, horseback riding, a climbing tower, sand volleyball, indoor-outdoor hockey, soccer, miles of hiking trails, boating, fishing, swimming, sailing, water-skiing, and canoeing. Waterfronts are supervised by certified lifeguards. All camp staff members receive specialized training in seizure recognition and first-aid training and a licensed pediatric neurologist and a registered nurse are on-site. Scholarships and financial assistance are available to eligible campers. Preference is given to residents of Western and Central PA.

Activities include: swimming, canoeing, fishing, horseback riding, arts and crafts, organized sports, hiking, epilepsy education and campfire sing-a-longs. Camper to staff ratio is 3:1. Camp counselors are certified in seizure .rst aid. There is an on-site neurologist, and two on-site nurses for distribution of medication and basic first aid.

"VO5 Hot Oil treatment is great at getting the final bits of EEG glue out of my daughter's hair."

"My son was throwing up and couldn't eat. His medication level dropped quickly and he had two grand-mal seizures in a row. It taught us to keep extra medication in chewable tablet form and rectal Valium gel in our house so we can try to avoid this problem in the future. Ask your doctor about special safety precautions you can take that will help you avoid emergencies."
